Throw out the rules this holiday season

There's a story going around on social media that feels particularly relevant this time of year. During the holidays with so much going on, it can be a little overwhelming. Gifts to purchase, social gatherings to attend, activities to create for the little ones while they're at home. All of it can pile on and paralyze us from time to time.

As the story goes, a person is overwhelmed by life, and the straw that breaks the camel's back is a pile of dirty dishes. The thought of having to scrub them before putting them in their subpar dishwasher is just too much to take. The person feels embarrassed to acknowledge this to their therapist, but the therapist nods calmy and offers a simple answer: Run the dishwasher twice. Without missing a beat, the person tells the therapist you're not supposed to. Then the therapist says: Why aren't you supposed to? If you don't want to scrub the dishes and your dishwasher is terrible, run it twice. Run it three times. Who cares? Rules do not exist, so stop giving yourself rules.

The point of the story is that we sometimes impose rules on ourselves that we think we must follow. They can overtake our lives and paralyze us. Don't let them. Learn to recognize that sometimes we don't need rules. Run the dishwasher twice, because there are no rules.

As the holidays roll on and more social and family commitments inevitably pop up, take a step back to make sure those rules you've created aren't getting in the way of your well-being and the wellbeing of your family. Just as it's okay to say 'yes' to some commitments, it's also ok to say 'no' to others. Remember, rules put limits on what's possible. Ignore some rules this holiday season and give yourself more possibilities for happiness.

St. Nicholas Day (Dec. 5 or 6). Also known as the Feast of Saint Nicholas, Christians honor the birthday of Saint Nicholas—the inspiration behind Santa Claus, given his proclivity towards gift-giving.

Immaculate Conception Day (Dec. 8). Catholics celebrate the day of Immaculate Conception to honor the Virgin Mary, who is believed to have been born without original sin. The day is often celebrated by going to church and enjoying a festive meal together.

Bodhi Day (Dec. 8). Also known as Rohatsu, this Buddhist tradition honors the day in which the Buddha—Siddartha Gautauma—is said to have achieved enlightenment. Many Buddhists celebrate it through meditation.

Feast Day of Our Lady Guadalupe (Dec.

12). Mexicans and Mexican-Americans often celebrate the feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe, the patron saint of Mexico who symbolizes patriotism and devotion. Millions of pilgrims typically visit the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in December to celebrate the festival, which marks one of several apparitions of the Virgin Mary that some Catholic believers say was witnessed by an indigenous Mexican man in 1531. The Virgin Mary's face is abundant in Mexico—in homes, shops and shrines.

Hanukkah (Dec. 18-26). The eight-day Jewish holiday of Hanukkah begins Dec. 18. A central part of the Jewish Festival of Lights entails the lighting of a ninebranched menorah each night. (The ninth candle is used to light the others.) The ritual symbolizes how one day's worth of oil miraculously lasted for eight days during a battle between a small group of Jewish people and the powerful Greek-Syrian army in 165 B.C. Per Jewish tradition, they are said to have emerged victorious and reclaimed the Holy Temple in Jerusalem. Customary foods include latkes (potato pancakes), sufganiyot (jamfilled donuts) and brisket. Children often play with a dreidel (a spinning top with Hebrew letters).

Yule (Dec. 21-Jan.1). Wiccans and Neo-Pagans celebrate the winter solstice (the darkest day of the year, on Dec. 21) through the festival of Yule. The winter solstice marks the shortest day and longest night of the year; Yule celebrates the re-emergence of the sun and the days beginning to grow longer again. The festival was first celebrated in Scandinavia as a Norse festival. A common tradition is burning the yule log, which originally was done to celebrate the sun's return. It has since also been folded into a Christmas tradition. In fact, Yule became associated with Christmas in the 9th century, although some still stick to the original Yule celebrations.

Boxing Day (Dec. 26). A British tradition that occurs the day after Christmas and dates back to the 1800s when Queen Victoria ruled the throne. At the time, it

was a day to ensure that upper class Britons gave servants and workers a day off, in addition to giving them a present. The holiday has since evolve into a more commercial occasion for gift-giving.

Kwanzaa (Dec. 26-Jan. 1). The weeklong holiday of Kwanzaa honors African-American heritage; it's a cultural holiday as opposed to a religious one. Black nationalist Maulana Karenga created Kwanzaa in 1966 as a way to unite the African-American community following the Watts Rebellion in a predominantly Black Los Angeles neighborhood. An uprising against systemic racism began after a white California highway patrol officer arrested a young Black man for drunken driving. The rebellion led to 34 deathstwo-thirds of which were individuals shot by police or National Guard troops, per the Associated Press. It also resulted in more than 1,000 injuries. Karenga laid out seven key principles for Kwanzaa: unity; selfdetermination; collective responsibility; cooperative economics; purpose; creativity; and faith. Its name comes from the Swahili phrase "matunda ya kwanza," which translates to "first fruits." Kwanzaa celebrations draw from African musical and storytelling traditions.

Zarathosht Diso (Dec. 26). Founded by the Prophet Zoroaster more than 3,000 years ago, Zoroastrianism is one of the world's oldest monotheistic religions. Zoroastrians honor the death of their prophet on this day, typically by visiting a fire temple and offering prayers.

around the world, as revelers party, set off fireworks, set resolutions and count down to midnight to welcome in new beginnings. In many post-Soviet countries, the holiday is celebrated with traditions similar to Christmas, such as the arrival of gifts from "Grandfather Frost."

Capac Raymi. The Andean Summer Solstice festival, known as Capac Raymi has been celebrated for hundreds of years since at least as far back as the early 15th century. It takes place in the weeks around December 21st, and is in part, a celebration of the Summer Solstice, the longest day of the year, corresponding to the first month of the Inca calendar. In Inca times, many complex celebrations and rituals existed that are no longer celebrated as they were, due to the influence of Catholicism. Nowadays, the original Inca celebration is mixed with Catholic ideas in a form of syncretism, combining elements of both religions. The December 21st festival is thought to mark the separation of two months in the Inca calendar that honored the Sun, Inti, and the Moon, Quilla, which also represent the masculine and feminine aspects of life. Capac Raymi, meaning Royal Feast, is the first month leading up to December 21st, and Capac Raymi Camay Quilla, meaning Festival of the Moon, is the month after the Summer solstice. A determining factor for the length of these celebrations was how soon the new moon appeared after the Summer Solstice. So the festivities could be longer or shorter, based on the Inca's measurements of this period of days, and possibly other planetary aspects.




Secure ABA therapy coverage in 2024!

Renew your Health Insurance Marketplace plan during open enrollment, starting November 1st!

If you currently have a plan through the Health Insurance Marketplace, now's the time to renew your policy and secure continued ABA therapy coverage for 2024.

Does your employer's plan exclude ABA therapy services?

Consider a Child-Only policy through the Marketplace for ABA coverage in the new year!



Enroll by December 15, 2022 for coverage that starts January 1, 2023.

Important dates

November 1: Open Enrollment starts for health coverage for the next plan year — first day you can enroll in, re-enroll in, or change health plans through the Health Insurance Marketplace®. Coverage can start as soon as January 1.

December 15: Last day to enroll in or change plans for coverage to start January 1.

January 1: Coverage starts for those who enroll in or change plans by December 15 and pay their first premium. January 15: Open Enrollment ends — last day to enroll in or change health plans for the year. After this date, you can enroll in or change plans only if you qualify for a Special Enrollment Period.

February 1: Coverage starts for those who enroll in or change plans December 16 through January 15 and pay their first premium.

DID YOU KNOW?

You can get health coverage for the rest of the year if you qualify for:

- A Special Enrollment Period due to a recent life event, like losing other coverage, moving, getting married, or having a baby.
