

fertility with feasts, music, and revelry. Similarly, the Romans held Bacchanalia, which involved days of indulgence and celebration.

The Evolution into an Academic Break.

In the mid-1930s, a swimming coach from Colgate University decided to take his team down to Florida for some early training at a brand-new Olympic-size pool in sunny Fort Lauderdale. The idea clicked with other college swim coaches and soon the spring training migration became an annual tradition for swimmers nationwide. Now, spring break is an academic tradition in various mostly western countries that is scheduled for different periods depending on the state and sometimes the region.

Spring Break's Rise in Popular Culture.

The 1960 novel "Where the Boys Are" by Glendon Swarthout, which was later adapted into a film in 1960, played a significant role in popularizing Spring Break. The movie depicted college students heading to Florida for fun and romance, influencing generations of students to do the same. By the 1980s, the tradition had become synonymous with partying, with MTV's Spring Break specials further cementing its image as a rite of passage for college students.

Modern Spring Break Trends

Today, Spring Break is not limited to Florida—students flock to destinations like Cancún, Mexico, South Padre Island, Texas, and Las Vegas, Nevada. While partying remains a big draw, many
